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It's the end of the week already and it's been a week in which we have already achieved so much. But in the interest of keeping it to two sides, let's crack on...

#### **West Yorkshire Games**

A big congratulations to our outstanding Year 4 and Year 5 athletes this week. Earlier this

year, Gracie and Madeline qualified for the finals of the West Yorkshire games at Temple Newsome, which took place on 22nd February in the cold and the wet. From a field which spanned the entire of West Yorkshire, the girls competed alongside over a hundred other runners over a course in excess of 1000m.



Gracie (Y3) finished 20th in her race, and Madeline (Y5) finished 38th. Both girls took on the challenge with the perfect attitude and their placings represent an outstanding achievement. We (as well as their families of course) are incredibly proud of them. Well done girls - Neiley Races next!

### A Meltham CE School Vision

Over the last 12 months, school has developed a new vision statement which children, support staff, teachers, the Diocese of Leeds and many parents (if you can remember back to the March parents evening last year) have been involved with. Our vision fits with our ethos, our values as a Church of England School and with our core curriculum drivers of Standout, Shoutout and Break out. In the end, of course, it was the children of our School Council who got the final say on the wording (and who am I to disagree!):

From little sparkles to shining stars, we Stand Out,
Break Out and Shout Out to
give us the confidence and skills to grow our Christian
values and make a difference.

Over the coming months we will ensure it is visible in the learning environment, on our website and in communications.

## **Pupil Survey Headlines**

Our annual pupil survey is a way of taking a snapshot of children's feelings about their learning and their school. Along with the parent's survey which comes later in the spring term, it helps to inform the school of areas of success, and areas we can try to make improvements in.

- 95% of our children enjoy being at school.
- 100% of our children said that they are challenged in their lessons every week.
- 91% of children told us that they enjoy all their learning.
- 96% of children told us that there is an adult in school they can trust to speak to if they are worried.
- 80% of children believe behaviour in class is almost always

- good (whilst less than 1% believed behaviour in lessons is not good).
- 94% of children feel that bullying does not happen but if it does it is dealt with effectively.
- 98% of children feel safe at school.
- 98% of children think school encourages independence.
- 98% of children agree school encourages them to look after themselves physically.
- 97 % of children told us that school teaches and encourages them to look after their emotional wellbeing and mental health
- 96% of our children would consider recommending their school to a friend in another school.

Of course children's opinions of school change on a daily (or even lesson by lesson) basis, but we are certainly encouraged by the results of this year's survey.

### **Important Staffing News**

After Easter, our Assistant Head and SENDCo Miss Drake returns to school in her Year 6 role. Sadly and reluctantly, we will say goodbye and good luck to Mr. Charlesworth, who moves on to a new job working with children outside the school environment with their learning and social, emotional and mental health development.

We also bid a fond farewell to Hayley Taylor who has supported both children and staff in Early Years for over eight years. I know she will be very much missed by children, staff and parents alike.

Also after Easter, Miss Varley returns from her own maternity leave and will take her place back in her own Class 5. She returns to work part-time, bringing her Year 2 experience to work alongside Mrs. Stocks who will continue her role as class teacher from Monday to Wednesday. A big thank you from me to Mrs. Myers, who has stepped into Class 5 to provide consistency this term.

## **Online Safety**

As children, we rely on adults to help us resolve situations that cause upset, stress or worry. This is known as co-regulation. The next phase, once autonomy has begun to develop, is called **self-regulation**: this is when children start to become capable of exercising more control over their impulses and behaviours. This vital developmental milestone however, isn't reached spontaneously. Learning to self-regulate requires guidance from trusted adults – simply talking with children about their thoughts and feelings, for instance, can ease the route to self-regulation. This week we are sharing a guide to support parents when working with their children on self-regulation. It has some expert tips for supporting them to reach this goal.

## **Writing Development**

As part of this year's school improvement priorities, you may be aware that we are currently focusing on writing and in particular, on raising standards in writing. As part of this work, we have undertaken several monitoring cycles of writing across the entire school, dating back to the summer term of 2022-23 with the most recent being this week.

As a result of our findings, we have put an increased emphasis on the accuracy and frequency of children's handwriting across school. We are also working hard to ensure the *correctness* of the children's basic punctuation, insisting that foundations such as capital letters, full stops, commas (among many other things) are present and correct in our writing.

School has now re-designed the way in which it assess the children's writing over the course of the year. We have been supported in this by our local pyramid of schools, with whom we take part in regular writing assessment moderation, and by the school's KLP (Kirklees Learning Partner) who has been working alongside us this term to provide external input on our progress against our target.

In addition to this, the way we provide feedback to the children has changed slightly: there is now a greater emphasis on direct constructive and celebratory communication with the children during their learning. Teaching and support staff will make 'point of misconception' interventions during writing sessions in addition to post-work marking, wherever possible. The idea is that we minimise the number of times children sleep on a misconception. You may notice a little less teacher pen in your child's book on parents evening, but this certainly doesn't mean it hasn't been looked at and reflected upon.

Please look out for further communications on the exact date and time that the slots will go live. If you make an appointment on these evenings, the children's books will be available for you to look at in the school hall.
